The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland for the year ended 31 December 2021. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 10 & 11 of these accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

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### **Objectives and Activities**

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Our vision is 'To be a church which inspires people with the Good News of Jesus Christ through our enthusiasm, worship, witness, nurture and service.'

Whilst the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic and its subsequent variants have necessitated strict compliance with the Scottish Government's regulatory legislation and the Church of Scotland's Covid Group guidance requirements - the church has remained dedicated to maintaining continuity in terms of both worship and witness to as many people as possible using all conceivable resources at its disposal.

Worship is normally conducted in our Church building in Blyth Street, Newport-on-Tay, on a regular weekly basis with additional services provided during Holy Week and Christmas. Additional provision includes Communion, the conduct of weddings, funerals and baptisms for the members and adherents of the congregation and for the residents of our parish. In more normal times a shorter Evening Service is held, often following a more traditional and reflective format.

Services are conducted by our Minister Rev. Dr. Amos Chewachong and led by a representative of our Worship Team during his absence, when on holiday or acting as Interim Moderator in a neighbouring Parish. Members of the congregation are encouraged to participate in our Services through the Call to Worship, Scripture Readings and leading the congregation in prayer.

Our young people's ministry provision consists of Sunday Club (P1-P7) supported by volunteers from within the congregation and Youth Seekers (S1-S6, College) run by our full-time Youth Worker; a crèche is provided during morning worship when required.

Pastoral Care for the vulnerable, the bereaved, and others in need, is provided by the minister, the Pastoral Care Team, the Flower Group, the Kirk Session (through elders' districts co-ordinated by the Clerk and Roll Keeper).

The fabric of our buildings and their environs are maintained on a 5-year rolling programme by our Property Manager and his team. When specialist work is required, estimates are sought, and Kirk Session approval is required, before work is undertaken.

The choir, under the guidance of the organist, plays an active role in leading the hymn singing, with introits and anthems an integral part of our worship format. Special choral services, e.g., Lessons and Carols, are held to mark significant events throughout the Christian calendar.

The Church website and Facebook page are maintained regularly to give up to date information on the Church itself, along with details of forthcoming services and events. Weekly audio downloads of each Sunday Service are made available online, with earlier recordings housed in the archive. News of Church life and witness is also contained within the monthly church magazine "The Journal," which is distributed to all households in the Congregation.

Our café 'manna' is open 5 days a week and offers an opportunity for families, groups, and individuals to meet up and enjoy a wide variety of beverages, soups, sandwiches, and home bakes. Again, in more normal times, it provides accommodation and facilities for our Youth Café – a Sunday evening initiative hosted by our Youth Worker.

Our hall and suite of rooms in Kirk House are used by both church-based groups and outside organisations including Boys' Brigade, Brownies, Rainbows, Probus, Pilates and Keep Fit. In more recent times, following the closure of the village's Post Office counter, our Agnes Duncan Room has provided the base for a 'Pop-Up' Post Office, open two mornings each week.

### Achievements and Performance

The Covid pandemic and government-enforced lockdowns prompted the introduction of new communication software and hardware technology to broadcast our Worship Services both to and from the church building to the benefit of our gathered congregation and online worshippers. Our Digital Strategy Team, operating under the auspices of the Kirk Session, have explored and trialled a variety of service delivery methodologies and continue to work towards the development of a comprehensive and robust solution.

These and further advancements will undoubtedly not only benefit our church and its congregation, but also our North Fife Cluster of Churches as we work collaboratively to resolve a meaningful and sustainable solution towards worship provision in this diverse geographic region.

The church continues to support both local and national charities through responses to community and national appeals, along with personal fund-raising initiatives. Beneficiaries this past year include the Taybridgehead Foodbank, Christian Aid, Poppyscotland, and World Vision.

### **Financial Review**

The total Net Income for the year was  $\pounds$ 5,607, the main contributing factors being a "gain" on the revaluation of investments ( $\pounds$ 13,162) and surplus income at manna ( $\pounds$ 10,967 – as a result of significant grants received in respect of the impact of Covid-19); meanwhile, there was net expenditure in the Youth Fund ( $\pounds$ 9,389) chiefly during the period when manna was closed in the first months of the year, Fabric Fund expenditure was in excess of income ( $\pounds$ 5,891), together with a depreciation charge for the Cupar Road shop properties ( $\pounds$ 5,000). NB The investment gain and the depreciation are accounting adjustments with no cash involved.

The total Net Income of £5,607 compared to Net Expenditure of £17,520 in 2020. The major reasons for the change between these years were the increase on the revaluation of our investments (£15,218), a net increase in surplus income at manna (£11,000), and reduced spending from the Parish Development Fund (£7,480); this was partly offset by reduced income from the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme towards the costs of our youth worker (£6,253).

After transferring £10,000 to the Fabric Fund, the balances carried forward on the General Fund were £44,566 (Capital) and £24,094 (Revenue).

### Income

Income from our Offerings (including Gift Aid recovered) in 2021 was £59,124 (2020 : £50,754) an increase of 16.5% (£8,370) from 2020. This very significant increase almost reverses the large reduction in 2020 caused by the impact of the Covid-19 restrictions, which resulted in our church being closed for most of the year. Thankfully, there are a number of members giving by standing order, while a few others have physically made regular payments since "lockdown" began; to them we are indeed grateful. Unfortunately, we have lost much income from the "Open Plate" and from many of those who have been unable to attend worship in the church building while the restrictions were in place (despite the comprehensive steps taken to ensure that our services are as free from infection as possible. 52 (an increase of 3) out of a membership of 317 actively use the Gift Aid scheme and 33 of these contribute by means of a standing order through their bank.

Other Donations totalled £2,957, a decrease of £2,211 mainly due to a donation towards Youth Work of £1,000 in 2020). Members also contributed £3,589 to other charitable causes during the year (2020 : £1,254) – these figures are again obviously distorted by the inability (due to the Covid-19 restrictions) to conduct events to raise such funds but do reflect the slow return towards more "normal" circumstances.

Income from the use of our hall complex was only £811 (a fall of £2,243), due to the requirement to close these premises for most of the year; in 2019, our income was £6,236. The trading income from manna showed a modest increase of £4,278 (11.0%) to £43,027 primarily as a result of shorter periods of enforced closure in 2021 (albeit continuing with significant precautions and procedures in place), but still about 40% less than the income in 2019.

### Income (cont.)

Over the course of the year, our financial predicament benefitted from two significant public sector sources. The Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme supported salary payments to our employees while they were furloughed, assisting us to continue paying all our employees their full salary; we received a total of £15,116 (2020 : £26,527) in respect of our Youth Worker, manna staff, organist and the church & hall cleaners. In addition, manna was successful in its application for grants of £22,050 (2020 : £10,000) from the Coronavirus Business Support Fund, some of which will be required to support the reduced level of trading which is continuing into 2022. An additional bonus was the receipt of a grant from The Northwood Trust of £1,200 towards the costs of our Digital Strategy Project.

### Expenditure

Total Expenditure in 2021 was £175,517, an increase of £7,255 (4.3%) from 2020. While most items of expenditure continued in line with budget and with the previous year, significant changes were higher expenditure on fabric repairs & maintenance (£10,411) - see below – and smaller increases in Presbytery Dues (£1,825 - £0 due in 2020), Minister's Expenses (£1,961 especially travel), Salaries (£2,209) and water charges (£2,651 - £0 due in 2020). We benefitted from a nationwide one-off reduction of 16% (£8,195) in our contribution to the Ministries & Mission Fund.

Government restrictions again caused the five-year programme of property maintenance to stall further. The repair and maintenance of our properties in 2021 cost £15,463, which was initially charged to the Fabric Fund. These costs included accident repairs to the Scott Street boundary wall £8,784 (fully refunded by insurers), external repairs and painter work at Kirk House Complex (£2,100) & Kerr Street (£1,192), and revarnishing of the Hall floor in Kirk House Complex (£800).

### Investment Policy and Performance

Recognising the lack of expertise within the trustees to manage our investments (currently approx. £145,000), it was decided some years ago to transfer this responsibility to Barclays Wealth (with an appropriate fee payable). Our investments are currently held as a "Discretionary Account" with a "Balanced Portfolio" prime investment objective and a "Moderate Risk Tolerance". These comprise units in Barclays Charity Fund; this provides the benefits of belonging to a large fund (with its spread of investments and risk, together with a lower management fee). The Fund was established in 2013 and its performance and income received are in line with current market trends and results.

### **Risk Management**

The trustees recognise the risks inherent in resourcing and delivering a challenging programme of worship and mission in an era of increasing financial constraints and a membership ageing and reducing in number. They have assessed the major risks to which we are exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Church. They are satisfied that our exposure to major risks is mitigated by systems in place, including Safeguarding policy, GDPR policy, financial control procedures, and regular reporting by all committees. We are insured through the Church of Scotland Insurance Company and the level of cover is reviewed annually to ensure that it is adequate.

A major impending risk is the significant projected reduction in the number of Church of Scotland ministers and there is currently a moratorium on the filling of any vacancies. The impact of this is that North Fife Cluster has one charge with a Locum Minister and one with its own Minster (us) - while he is acting as Interim Moderator to the remaining four churches in the Cluster for the foreseeable future. There are obvious concerns regarding the future workload of ministers (such as ours) currently in a charge who will have to provide support for other charges. Fife Presbytery is required to prepare its Plan by 31 December 2022 and is seeking the views of each Cluster regarding their preferences locally.

The onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Scottish Government's response through its lockdown measures and the Church of Scotland's strict guidance on the re-opening of buildings and associated worship practices, have necessitated the completion of a range of obligatory checklists and risk assessments. These risks and changing guidance are frequently monitored with major changes approved by the Kirk Session. In January 2022, the number of restrictions is gradually reducing, though caution will continue to be exercised with regard to the mitigations in place.

### **Reserves Policy**

The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have considered their current and future liabilities. It is the trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months expenditure excluding endowment, restricted and designated funds. At the year-end, the Church held unrestricted funds of £212,958 of which £50,000 was the Building Valuation Fund and £94,298 had been designated for Fabric Fund, Choir & Organ Fund, etc. Within the balance held in the General Fund (£68,660) are the recently-received legacies of £53,561, while the remaining £15,099 represented approx. 2.4 months' General Fund expenditure. In the current difficult circumstances, the trustees feel that this is a reasonable position.

The Church also held £62,742 in restricted funds and £22,786 in Endowment Funds, which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 14.

### Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered Scottish charity, number SC006758; it is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

The Unitary Constitution allows the single body of the Kirk Session and its constituent committees, which are capable of having members who are not elders, to oversee both civil and ecclesiastical issues. Meetings of Session are scheduled on a monthly basis (excluding the summer months), with committees, which are free to meet as required during the year, reporting to Session on a rotational basis.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropri3ate gifts, Christian maturity and skills. The Minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Fife Presbytery; in the absence of a minister, Fife Presbytery appoint an interim moderator to take his/her place.

### Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland Year Ended 31 December 2021

I report on the accounts of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland for the year ended 31 December 2021 which are set out on pages 8 to 18.

### **Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner**

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity's trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

### **Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement**

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. ## Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland Year Ended 31 December 2021

### **Accounting Policies**

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items that are considered to be material to the accounts, are set out below.

### **Basis of Preparation**

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice ('Charities SORP') applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

### **Fund Accounting**

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

<u>Restricted funds</u> are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity. <u>{Endowment funds</u> are restricted funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.}

reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.} <u>Unrestricted funds</u> are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are <u>designated</u> as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

### **Incoming Resources**

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

### **Donated Services and Facilities**

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) the general volunteer time of congregational members is not recognised. On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

### Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable.

### **Fixed Assets**

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, Kirk House Complex, Manse (17 East Station Place) and house (12 Kerr Street), all vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Ownership of four shops (two currently occupied by manna) in Cupar Road (nos. 11, 13, 17, 19) is vested locally.

Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of all these assets (excluding the four shops) is charged to the Fabric Fund as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

Expenditure incurred on the maintenance and management of the four shop properties is charged to the General Fund and recorded in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the liability arises.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £5,000 and having a value to the charity greater than one year, other than those acquired for specific purposes, are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives; depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition but not in the year of disposal. The only such assets held by the charity are the above freehold properties (Cupar Road shops), which are depreciated over 20 years.

### Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date.

Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for National Insurance, pension and Housing & Loan Fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £28,700 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years of service) £35,269.

No Pulpit Supply costs were incurred during the year as Services during the Minister's absence on annual leave, etc., were conducted by members of the congregation.

### 14 Movement in Funds (ctd.)

Purposes of Endowment Funds

Income from the Mission and Aid Bequests is to be used to help meet the Ministries and Mission Allocation. Income received is transferred to the General Fund annually.

### Purposes of Restricted Funds

manna : café whose proceeds contribute significantly towards the costs of employing our youth worker. Youth Work : income regularly transferred from manna to finance the costs of our youth worker.

Digital Strategy Project : to develop and implement the ability to stream worship, etc., to and from the Church building in a secure and stable manner.

Newport Church / Cameroon Project : this will finance one or more projects (still to be identified) in Cameroon to support the welfare there, especially with regard to children and their education.

### Purposes of Unrestricted Funds (set aside by the trustees)

Building Valuation Fund : to record the estimated value of locally-held property (shop units at 11 - 19 Cupar Road).

Benevolent Fund : to provide sundry cash payments and appropriate gifts to those in need.

Choir & Organ Fund: to finance the maintenance of the organ and the acquisition of music and other musical instruments.

Fabric Fund : for the maintenance of the Church's properties.

Journal Fund : to assist with the costs of producing the charity's magazine (nine times per year). Parish Development Fund : to finance projects to promote the charity, especially within the local parish the community.

Sunday School Fund : to assist with the costs of running the Sunday School.

### Church Groups / Organisations

Gardening Club : net income from members, currently held by the charity while club is in abeyance, and is being spent on specific acquisitions for the Church/Kirk House Complex grounds.

Stewardship Committee : principally funded by Wednesday and Sunday serving of teas & coffees; income is used for a variety of purposes within this charity.

Sunday School Collections : offerings distributed to support a child in Bolivia through World Vision.

### 15 Volunteers

In common with all congregations of the Church of Scotland the congregation benefits from the significant contribution made by volunteers who give their time and talents willingly for the benefit of the Church. The areas of congregational life which rely on the contribution of volunteers are many and varied and much of the activity would be unable to continue were it not for the commitment shown by them.

Similar appreciation must be expressed to those who make non-monetary donations, often unseen and always unrequested. Their support, particularly noticeable during the difficult period of the Covid pandemic, has been invaluable and is extremely difficult to quantify financially, hence no adjustment has been made to our accounts.
