The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland for the year ended 31 December 2022. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 10 & 11 of these accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

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Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Our own local vision is 'To be a church which inspires people with the Good News of Jesus Christ through our enthusiasm, worship, witness, nurture and service.'

Worship is normally conducted in our Church building in Blyth Street, Newport-on-Tay, on a regular weekly basis with additional services provided during Holy Week and Christmas. Additional provision includes Communion and the conduct of weddings, funerals and baptisms for the members and adherents of the congregation and for the residents of our parish.

Services are conducted by our Minister Rev. Dr. Amos Chewachong and led by a representative of our Worship Team during his absence, when on holiday or acting as Interim Moderator in a neighbouring Parish. Members of the congregation are encouraged to participate in our services through the Call to Worship, Scripture Readings and leading the congregation in prayer.

During Sunday worship, our Young People's Ministry provision consists of Sunday Club (P1-P6) supported by volunteers from within the congregation and Youth Seekers (P7-S6) run by our full-time Youth Worker; a crèche is provided during morning worship when required.

In addition, our Youth Worker also runs a Youth Café on Sunday evenings (S1-S6) and during this past year has introduced a monthly Messy Church at which the majority of those attending have no connection to our Church.

The fabric of our buildings and their environs are maintained on a rolling programme by our Property Team. When specialist work is required, estimates are sought, and Kirk Session approval is required, before work is undertaken.

The choir, under the guidance of the organist, plays an active role in leading the hymn singing, with introits, anthems and descants an integral part of our worship format. Special choral services, e.g., Lessons & Carols, are held to mark significant events throughout the Christian calendar.

The Church website and Facebook page are maintained regularly to give up to date information on the Church itself, along with details of forthcoming services and events. Weekly audio downloads of each Sunday service are made available online, with earlier recordings housed in the archive. News of Church life and witness is also contained within the monthly church magazine "Journal," which is distributed to all households in the congregation.

Our café 'manna' is open 6 days a week and offers an opportunity for families, groups, and individuals to meet up and enjoy a wide variety of beverages, soups, sandwiches, and home bakes.

Our hall and suite of rooms in Kirk House are used by both church-based groups and outside organisations including Boys' Brigade, Brownies, Rainbows, Pilates and Keep Fit. In more recent times, following the closure of the village's Post Office counter, our Agnes Duncan Room has provided the base for a 'Pop-Up' Post Office, open on two mornings each week.

Achievements and Performance

The Covid-19 pandemic and government-enforced lockdowns prompted the introduction of new communication software and hardware technology to broadcast our worship services both to and from the church building. Our Digital Strategy Team, operating under the auspices of the Kirk Session, have developed service delivery via Zoom (using a Broadband connection direct into the Church) to the benefit of our gathered congregation and online worshippers.

These and further advancements will undoubtedly not only benefit our church and its congregation, but also our North Fife Cluster of Churches as we work collaboratively to resolve a meaningful and sustainable solution towards worship provision in this diverse geographic region.

As life returned to a more regular format, our Youth Worker has been able to gain access to our local primary school once again and has been able to lead "Bible Alive" sessions and to be involved, along with our Minister, in leading assemblies. Unfortunately, the school's Christmas Service was moved from our Church to the school at the last minute due to adverse weather conditions.

During the year our Guild was formed, following a period of many years since its predecessor had lapsed. Its initial focus has been on running a weekly prayer vigil for peace in Ukraine, together with raising funds for onward transmission there via the local Twinning Association (which is linked with Zolotarevo in western Ukraine). The Guild also held a series of four lunchtime concerts in the summer.

Financial Review

The total Net Expenditure for the year was £26,827. The main contributing factors were a "loss" on the revaluation of investments (£15,671), Fabric Fund expenditure in excess of its income (£2,893), net expenditure on the General Fund (£3,279 – against a budget deficit of £5,110), together with a depreciation charge for the Cupar Road shop properties (£5,000). NB The investment loss and the depreciation are accounting adjustments with no cash involved.

The total Net Expenditure of £26,827 compared to Net Income of £5,607 in 2021. The major reasons for the change between these years were the decrease on the revaluation of our investments (£28,833) and an increased Contribution made to the Ministries & Mission Fund (£5,036).

At the end of a year of increasing turnover, manna managed to achieve a break-even financial performance after contributing almost the full salary cost of our Youth Worker.

The balances carried forward on the General Fund were £39,564 (Capital) and £21,469 (Revenue).

Income

Income from our Offerings (including Gift Aid recovered) in 2022 was £59,219 (2021 : £59,168) an increase of 0.1% (£51) from 2021. This minimal increase masks the continuing recovery from the impact of the Covid-19 restrictions, as a small number of members had made additional payments during "lockdown" (to whom we are indeed grateful), while the income from the "Open Plate" in 2022 increased significantly (by £3,292) although it is only about half of its pre-Covid-19 level. 49 (a decrease of 3) out of a membership of 301 actively use the Gift Aid scheme and 32 of these contribute by means of a standing order through their bank.

Other Donations totalled £5,143, an increase of £2,230 mainly due to our Guild's first year's income of £1,862. Members also contributed £5,711 to other charitable causes during the year (2021 : £3,589).

Income from the use of our hall complex was £4,873 (an increase of £4,062); in 2019, our income was £6,236. As the year progressed, turnover at manna steadily increased as people became more comfortable with the easing of Covid-19 restrictions; the trading income showed an increase of £39,021 (90.7%) to £82,048.

Over the course of 2021, our financial predicament had benefitted from two significant public sector sources. The Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme supported salary payments to our employees while they were furloughed, assisting us to continue paying all our employees their full salary; in 2021 we received a total of £15,116 in respect of our Youth Worker, manna staff, organist and the church & hall cleaners. In addition, manna was successful in its application for grants of £22,050 in 2021 from the Coronavirus Business Support Fund; in early 2022 manna received a final grant of £5,900 from this Fund.

Financial Review (cont.)

Expenditure

Total Expenditure in 2022 was £188,180, an increase of £12,663 (7.2%) from 2021. While most items of expenditure continued in line with budget and with the previous year, significant changes were higher trading expenditure at manna (£13,892) as a result of much-increased turnover, higher expenditure on Ministries & Mission Fund Contribution (£5,036), and Salaries (£3,550). Meanwhile, there was reduced expenditure on fabric repairs & maintenance (£9,428).

The repair and maintenance of our properties in 2022 cost £6,035, which was initially charged to the Fabric Fund. These costs included repairs to the Church roof & gutters £2,270 (mostly refunded by insurers), repairs to Church heating £1,036, installation of CCTV at Kirk House (£760) and replacement smoke alarms at the Manse (£537), together with various items of testing, servicing, etc.

Investment Policy and Performance

Acknowledging the lack of appropriate expertise within the trustees, it was decided some years ago to transfer this responsibility to Barclays Investment Solutions Ltd. (with an appropriate fee payable). Our investments (currently approx.. £130,000) are held as a "Discretionary Account" with a "Balanced Portfolio" prime investment objective and a "Moderate Risk Tolerance". These comprise units in Barclays Charity Fund; this provides the benefits of belonging to a large fund (with its spread of investments and risk, together with a lower management fee). The Fund was established in 2013 and its performance and income received are in line with current market trends and results.

Risk Management

The trustees recognise the risks inherent in resourcing and delivering a challenging programme of worship and mission in an era of increasing financial constraints and a membership ageing and reducing in number. They have assessed the major risks to which we are exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Church. They are satisfied that our exposure to major risks is mitigated by systems in place, including Safeguarding policy, GDPR policy and appropriate financial control procedures. We are insured through the Church of Scotland Insurance Company and the level of cover is reviewed annually to ensure that it is adequate.

A major impending risk is the significant impact of Fife Presbytery's recently approved Mission Plan introduced as a result of the projected reduction in the number of Church of Scotland ministers. This has led to individual Clusters working towards a suitable resolution to accommodate the number of Minsters allocated to it. The position in North Fife Cluster is gradually becoming clearer, but there is still some uncertainty about the exact road ahead. The position is further complicated by the impending 7-year review of our Minister's tenure here in Newport, which will be determined during the coming year.

The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, with the number of restrictions gradually reducing, means that caution will continue to be required with regard to the mitigations in place. In addition, attendances at worship and financial generosity have still not fully recovered to the level experienced before "lockdown".

Reserves Policy

The trustees have considered the reserves required, including current and future liabilities. It is the trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months expenditure excluding endowment, restricted and designated funds. At the year-end, the Church held unrestricted funds of £190,657 of which £45,000 was the Building Valuation Fund and £84,624 had been designated for Fabric Fund, Choir & Organ Fund, etc. Within the balance held in the General Fund (£61,033) are the unallocated portion of recently-received legacies of £43,561, while the remaining £17,472 represented approx. 2.6 months' General Fund expenditure. In the current difficult circumstances, the trustees feel that this is a reasonable position.

The Church also held £60,773 in restricted funds and £20,229 in endowment funds, which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 14.

Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered Scottish charity, number SC006758. It is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

The Unitary Constitution allows the single body of the Kirk Session and its constituent committees, which are capable of having members who are not elders, to oversee both civil and ecclesiastical issues. Meetings of Session are scheduled on a monthly basis (excluding the summer months), with committees, which are free to meet as required during the year, reporting to Session on a rotational basis.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the active elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts, Christian maturity and skills. The Minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Fife Presbytery; in the absence of a minister, Fife Presbytery appoint an Interim Moderator to take his/her place.

I report on the accounts of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland for the year ended 31 December 2022 which are set out on pages 8 to 18.

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity's trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items that are considered to be material to the accounts, are set out below.

Basis of Preparation

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice ('Charities SORP') applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Fund Accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

<u>Restricted funds</u> are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

<u>{Endowment funds</u> are restricted funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.} Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are <u>designated</u> as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming Resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donated Services and Facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) the financial benefit of general volunteer time of congregational members is not recognised.

Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable.

Fixed Assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, Kirk House Complex, Manse (17 East Station Place) and house (12 Kerr Street), all vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Ownership of four shops (two currently occupied by manna) in Cupar Road (nos. 11, 13, 17, 19) is vested locally.

Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of all these assets (excluding the four shops) is charged to the Fabric Fund as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

Expenditure incurred on the maintenance and management of the four shop properties is charged to the General Fund and recorded in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £5,000 and having a value to the charity greater than one year are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives; depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition but not in the year of disposal. The only such assets currently held by the charity are the above freehold properties (Cupar Road shops), which are depreciated over 20 years.

Accounting Policies (cont.)

Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date.

<u>Unrealised gains and losses</u> represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or (if purchased in the year) the difference between the cost and the market value at the end of the year. <u>Realised gains and losses</u> represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or the cost if purchased in the year.

Resources Expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Taxation

Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for National Insurance, pension and Housing & Loan Fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £28,700 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years of service) £35,269.

No Pulpit Supply costs were incurred during the year during the Minister's absence on annual leave, etc., as those services were conducted by appropriate members of the congregation. However, costs were incurred during the Presentation Service and Baptism Service for the Minister's baby daughter.

Trustee Remuneration and Related Party Transactions 8

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During the year, one trustee received reimbursement of expenses incurred totalling £6,728. Mrs Diane Miller received £18,666 in respect of her employment as the manager of manna.

Mrs Eleanor Owen received £260 for providing her services as Supply Organist during the year.

14 Movement in Funds (ctd.)

Purposes of Endowment Funds

Income from the Mission and Aid Bequests is to be used to help meet the Ministries and Mission Allocation. Income received is transferred to the General Fund annually.

Purposes of Restricted Funds

manna : café whose proceeds contribute significantly towards the costs of employing our Youth Worker. Youth Work : income regularly transferred from manna to finance the costs of our Youth Worker. Digital Strategy Project : to develop and implement the ability to stream worship, etc., to and from the Church building in a secure and stable manner.

Newport Church / Cameroon Project : this will finance one or more projects (still to be identified) in Cameroon to support the welfare there, especially with regard to children and their education.

Purposes of Unrestricted Funds (set aside by the trustees)

Building Valuation Fund : to record the estimated value of locally-held property (shop units at 11, 13, 17, 19 Cupar Road).

Benevolent Fund : to provide sundry cash payments and appropriate gifts to those in need.

Choir & Organ Fund: to finance the maintenance of the organ and the acquisition of music and other musical instruments.

Fabric Fund : for the maintenance of the Church's properties.

Journal Fund : to assist with the costs of producing the charity's magazine (nine times per year). Parish Development Fund : to finance projects to promote the charity, especially within the local parish and the community.

Sunday School Fund : to assist with the costs of running the Sunday School.

Church Groups / Organisations

Church of Scotland Guild : net income from events, donations, sale of cards, etc. Donations have been made to support projects in Zolotarevo (Ukraine) and local welfare activities.

Gardening Club : net income from members, currently held by the charity while club is in abeyance, and is being spent on specific acquisitions for the Church/Kirk House Complex grounds.

Stewardship Committee : principally funded by the serving of teas & coffees following Sunday services; income is used for a variety of purposes within this charity.

Sunday School Collections : offerings distributed to support a child in Bolivia through World Vision.

15 Volunteers

In common with all congregations of the Church of Scotland the congregation benefits from the significant contribution made by volunteers who give their time and talents willingly for the benefit of the Church. The areas of congregational life which rely on the contribution of volunteers are many and varied and much of the activity would be unable to continue were it not for the commitment shown by them.

Similar appreciation must be expressed to those who make non-monetary donations, often unseen and always unrequested. Their support, particularly noticeable during the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent recovery, has been invaluable and is difficult to quantify financially, hence no adjustment has been made to our accounts.
