

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Faith, Migration, and the Threads of a Forgotten Church

On a sweltering Thursday, 22nd May 2025, I stepped off the plane into the shimmering heat of Bahrain — a place most Scots would never associate with Christianity. And yet, there I stood, not just as a visitor, but as a witness to faith in the furnace. In Bahrain, a nation where the sun rarely retreats and Christianity survives mostly in the margins, I met with a prayer cell of about 50 Cameroonian Presbyterians, part of a diaspora community of over 500 in the country. They gather every Friday morning, not in a cathedral, but in a rented hotel room. No stained glass. No bells. Just voices raised in hope, songs of resilience, and a scripture that reminds them, and us: we are not forgotten in the fire.

I spoke from Exodus 32:7-14, the story of a people impatient in the wilderness, turning to idols while Moses lingers with God on the mountain. My theme was, "Not Forgotten in the Fire: The God Who Sees, Stays, and Saves." Because for those saints in Bahrain, the fire is not metaphorical, it is the heat of exhaustion, the burn of distance from family, the pressure of sending money home while living ten to a room. And yet, they sing. They believe. They gather.

It is tempting to think of faith as a comfort best nurtured in freedom and abundance. But faith, as I saw, is often forged in adversity. And Bahrain, unexpectedly, holds a secret chapter of that story. I learned that Bahrain is not new to Christianity. Archaeologists have uncovered remains of a Nestorian Christian complex on the island of Samahij, dating back as early as the 4th Century. This was once the seat of a bishop, a thriving Christian community centuries before Islam swept through the region. The building housed not just worship, but life: meals shared, garments woven, wine drunk from glassware now shattered, but not forgotten. The early Church of the East — the Nestorians, reached as far as China and India, anchored by trade and mission. Bahrain was not an outpost. It was a centre. It had bishops. It had crosses etched into its plaster walls. It had hope.

Fast forward to today, and Christianity exists in the shadows in Bahrain. But it persists, sometimes among Cameroonian migrants crammed into a hotel room, still praising a God they cannot always feel, in a land that barely acknowledges them. That is holy ground.

It made me think about Newport-on-Tay, where our faith has roots, resources, and history. Where church bells ring and worship happens in stone-built sanctuaries. Yet, how many pews now sit empty? How many lives here feel untouched by faith, though they live in freedom and opportunity? There is a challenge in that comparison, but not condemnation. Instead, it is an invitation to see our faith not as a cultural relic but as a living fire that needs tending. The Bahrain Christians remind us that the church is not defined by buildings or numbers, but by hearts alive in God. Their hardship sharpens their devotion. Their exile deepens their worship.

I return with a message not just about migration, but about mission. The Cameroonians in Bahrain are not just holding onto their faith, they are living it in a way that should stir us. And beneath their story is a buried history, one of crosses hidden in stone, of forgotten bishops, of sacred resilience in the sands. As we consider our own role in the story of the Church of Scotland, perhaps it is time to see ourselves anew, not just as keepers of a tradition, but as part of a global, ancient, and ongoing movement. One that reaches from the banks of the Tay to the deserts of Bahrain. From Nestorian bishops to migrant labourers. From forgotten fires to rekindled faith. God still sees. God still stays. God still saves. Let us not forget that.

Cameroon: A Tapestry of Culture

A couple of months ago, our minister Rev. Dr. Amos Chewachong hosted a Book Launch. It was to celebrate his newly published book 'Intra-African Pentacostalism and the Dynamics of Power', but it was also a celebration of Cameroonian culture, friendship and community. Following a panel discussion about the book, our friends from Cameroon wore beautifully vibrant traditional clothing in a fashion show, prepared the most fragrant and spicy food I have ever eaten and then freely danced the night away without inhibition. Since then, I have been watching videos on how to cook Cameroonian food, reading articles on how to dance with my shoulders and looking at photos of what this country looks like from the inside.

The next morning, I played their National Anthem, commonly known as 'The Rallying Song', composed by Cameroonian musician René Djam Afame. Studying the music earlier that week, I felt it was stylistically similar to the French National Anthem. I thought perhaps Afame studied in France but I soon discovered that Cameroon became independent from France in 1960. French is one of of the official languages alongside English, and other influences include the legal and political system, education, and bakeries.

This lasting legacy will not be without tension; colonialism is a raw subject. Some argue that maintaining French influences, including the language, is a form of neocolonialism. Others argue that the connection keeps their economy healthy as there are many French businesses operating in the heart of Cameroon.

French influences aside, there are 250 languages known to be spoken in Cameroon, and reports suggest it could actually be closer to 600. The country has been coined as 'Africa in miniature' owing to its rich ethnic and cultural diversity; this extends to the many traditions and practices found in one region to the next. This includes types of dancing, festivals, worship and interestingly, storytelling and herbal healing, which comes from the East region.

What I learned that evening was how free-spirited, genuine, and proud Cameroonians are of their heritage. It was a true joy to experience and I look forward to learning more about Cameroon and its people.

Youth Update

This past month was a busy one for our ministries. We had a primary weekend camp up at Alltnacriche, as well as a visit from Rachel Henry from Young Life to Ignite on top of what we already do!

Primary Weekend Away

We took 9 children to Alltnacriche for the Scripture Union Scotland Primary Perth Kinross and Fife Weekend Away. Our theme for the weekend was Deep Sea Divers, where we took a deep dive into four stories from Jesus' life - his birth, his baptism, healing of the paralysed man, and Easter.

Our children had lots of fun on the zipline, ropes course, dip in the burn, a BBQ and a campfire with smores, songs and skits. We also played an epic wide game on Sunday where we had to hunt rubber ducks in the first part, then split into two teams and capture the rubber ducks from the opposing team during the second part. It was a brilliant weekend for all and we can't wait to go back!

<u>Spark</u>

This month we have been looking at the Life of Jesus and whom he encountered; our final session was looking at Jesus and the criminals on the cross. We are looking at the book of Philippians for the remainder of this term.

We also looked at Matthew 28, where Jesus called his disciples to 'Go make disciples of all nations'. We did a challenge where each person would pick a prewritten topic, they would then spend just 5 minutes researching that topic and give a one minute presentation on what they learned to the rest of the group. This was to encourage each of our young people, that if they can present what they learned from a 5 minute Google, how much more confidence they should have sharing how they live their lives for God!

<u>Ignite</u>

This month we have looked at a mini-series called 'Them First'. We started off with a whole night looking at poverty, where the young people were given tokens of various amounts at the start of the night, where they could buy snacks at different points throughout the evening. They also had the opportunity to gain and lose tokens at any point, with the whole point looking at the injustice around being poor and what can we do to help.

The following week we looked at more about what we can do to help, what skills we can offer, and what we have, whether that is time, money or possessions.

We also had a special guest visit from Rachel Henry from Young Life, who led Ignite on Sunday 18th May. We had great fun learning about The Prodigal Son and dramatising it for the whole group, what Young Life do in St Andrews and we are also looking forward to Young Life Day Camps, happening during the first week of the summer holidays in Tayport.

We are having our All-Age end of year Prizegiving Service on Sunday 29th June starting at 11am. All are welcome to attend, as we celebrate our children, young people and volunteers who have been part of our groups throughout the past year.
