MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Still We Sing: The Enduring Voice of the Scottish Psalter in a Changing World

On Sunday 5th October 2025, the voices of the North Fife Cluster will rise in the Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland, not as echoes of nostalgia, but as living soundwaves of faith reverberating across time. From Newport to Balmerino & Wormit, from Balmullo to Leuchars St Athernase, from Tayport to Creich, Flisk and Kilmany, we gather not simply to remember a text, but to reawaken its meaning. We mark 375 years of the Scottish Metrical Psalter, not as an antiquarian exercise, but as a bold affirmation: the Church still sings and in singing, it survives. At first glance, it appears to be a regional festival. But beneath the hymns and harmonies lies something far more profound: a story of how a people, a tradition, and a world wrestling with transformation continue to find expression—truthfully and tenderly—through song.

What we will sing that day is not a polished performance. It is prayer in poetry, forged in the spiritual fires of history. From the searing honesty of *Psalm 139* to the timeworn comfort of *Psalm 23*, and the stirring cadence of "*All People That on Earth Do Dwell"*, these songs are not bound by one tradition, language, or continent. They are theological, yet not abstract; poetic, yet never evasive. They capture lament and praise, rebellion and trust, personal anguish and communal solidarity. In this sense, the Psalter does what few texts can: it meets us where doctrine and deep humanity intersect. The church walls that reverberate with these words are built of stone and story, just like the Psalms themselves. They have outlasted monarchs and movements, schisms and secularisation. And they continue to carry the voice of a people, even as that people reshapes itself in real time.

A Songbook for a Fragmented Nation

The Scottish Metrical Psalter was born into a storm. The year 1650 found Scotland in crisis. Its political structures were shaken, its religious identity contested, its people divided by loyalty, survival, and spiritual integrity. In that fragile moment, the Church did not respond with a proclamation of institutional power. It offered a book—not of laws, nor sermons, but of songs. Psalms rendered in metrical form, designed not to be read by clergy, but sung by the people. By crofters and soldiers, by mothers and ministers. This was not a liturgical luxury. It was a radical act of spiritual egalitarianism. It democratised worship. No need for pipe organs or parchment scrolls. All that was needed was the human voice, tuned by suffering, resilience, and faith. This Psalter became a portable sanctuary. It journeyed into homes, fields, jails, and gravesides. It sustained a people navigating collapse and gave voice to convictions too deep for prose. And in this, it joins a wider story—echoing the way African American spirituals rose from the cotton fields, how liberation theology found rhythm in Latin American resistance, or how Taizé chants drift over borders and language barriers. The Psalter is, in its own way, a Scottish liberation theology: simple, sturdy, and sung.

Singing Through the Tremors

Today, in 2025, we do not sing as those gazing wistfully at the past. We sing because we, too, live in disruption. Across Scotland, and indeed across much of the global Church, the structures that once defined faith communities are shifting. Congregations are merging. Buildings are closing. Clergy are stretched. Budgets tighten. The metrics of health feel increasingly detached from the movements of the Spirit. And yet here we are. Still singing. The Psalms are uniquely fitted for this moment, not because they solve our crises, but because they speak through them. They do not flinch from desolation or decay. They stare into uncertainty and declare, with trembling lips: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble... Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth give way" (Psalm 46:1–2). This is no triumphalism. It is what Walter Brueggemann calls "truthful speech"—not doctrinal escapism, but faithful witness amid the ruins.

The Church That Sings Is the Church That Survives

What we will experience at the Festival of Psalms will be more than a religious service. It is a kind of holy resistance. To sing in uncertain times is a theological act. It refuses the narrative of decline. It defies despair. It reshapes community, not around ideal conditions, but around a shared, resilient voice. We are not waiting for the Church to return to a mythical golden age. That age never existed. We are walking forward, carrying with us a liturgy that binds memory and imagination, and building a future rooted in tradition, but not trapped by it. The Psalms are not nostalgic. They are prophetic. And to sing them is to say, again and again: God is not done with us yet.

A Whisper at the End of Life

In Highland lore, there is a story of an old crofter on his deathbed. Offered formal prayers, he declined them all. He whispered instead, "Psalm 23. That'll do." Not because it was sentimental, but because it was sufficient. It had accompanied him through war, widowhood, and winter. "The Lord is my Shepherd..." was not a metaphor to him. It was muscle memory. The Psalms endure because they travel well. They carry truth across borders, generations, and crises. They are as relevant in Edinburgh as in Douala, as at a funeral in Fife as in a refugee camp in Gaza.

A Future Built on Song

As the Church continues to adapt globally and locally, it is tempting to see song as something supplemental, something extra. But what if, instead, we saw it as structural? What if the Psalms are not a relic of a slower age, but the infrastructure of the Church to come? Let us teach them to our children. Let them become breath prayers in our anxieties. Let them fill our kitchen tables, nursing homes, and picket lines. Because when the strategies and spreadsheets fall away, what remains, what always remains, is song. And so, we return to *Psalm 100*, which calls across centuries and continents: "Serve the Lord with gladness; come before His presence with singing."

Let us do just that. Again. And again. And again.

Amen. And pass the Psalter.

Review of Church Roll

Our Church keeps a roll of its members, who have joined by profession of faith, or by transfer of certificate, or by resolution of the Kirk Session; and also of adherents who, although not members, regularly attend worship.

We are required to review our rolls annually to ensure that they accurately record those who are taking part in the worship, mission, and service of the church. However, we continue to retain those who are unable to attend worship through ill-health or infirmity. But it is equally worthwhile for each of us to reflect on our own commitment to the work of Christ's church through our dedication of time, talents, and money, and also through the bonds that hold the family of God together. If you are not yet a member and would consider becoming one, please speak to the Minister or your Elder, and we can discuss the next steps.

The process of reviewing the roll also involves removing the names of those we have lost contact with over the years. Members have full voting rights on congregational matters, whereas adherents can only vote on certain matters. As the church reflects on and discusses the Union of the churches in our corner of Fife, it is important that those who are the living stones come together in the name of the Lord God, whom the writer of Hebrews calls "the builder of everything".

So please make this time of review a time also to review your relationship to the church, and if you would consider membership, please get in touch.

We are now in soup season and in need of another regular soup maker. If you think you can help please speak to me or Morag for more details.



Community Chest




