

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

The Christ-Child and the Quiet Work of Healing

The beginning of this Advent season meets me on the heels of a journey home. I have just returned from Cameroon, where I spent two weeks on Compassionate Leave, standing with my family as we honoured the passing to glory of loved ones who helped shape the very roots of our story. Those days were rich with memory. I reconnected with relatives I had not seen for years, welcomed friends who came with quiet condolences, and felt again the strength that rises when a community gathers around its grief. Among those we celebrated were Ma Abeng Justine and my grandmother-aunt, Mami Paulina. Their lives were different in many ways, yet they carried the same steady light that continues to guide us now.

Ma Abeng was a mother, mentor, and servant of the church whose voice never needed to be loud to be heard. Her wisdom shaped pastors, strengthened congregations, and guided leaders across the Presbyterian Church in Cameroon. She taught me that ministry is both a blessing and a burden, and that true greatness is found in service, not status. In her final years, when her physical strength grew thin, her son, Maître Abeng Roland, offered a devotion that became its own living homily. Each act of care, each morning greeting, each tender gesture spoke with a depth no sermon could match. Watching him, I was reminded of Viktor Frankl's insight that meaning is discovered through love, through suffering, and through the choices we make when life stands at its most fragile. He lived that truth with grace. He offered the flowers while she could still see and smell them.

Mami Paulina, on the other hand, carried her wisdom in quiet acts of love. She raised my mother, shaped our family, and taught us values that became the foundation of our lives. She lived simply, yet she carried a depth of compassion that reached across generations. Even without attending church regularly, she lived the gospel through kindness, fairness, and the belief that love is better than hate. Her life showed me that holiness can speak through humble acts. She blessed my steps from Wum to the university, to the seminary, and then to the United Kingdom. Her words and prayers follow me still.

Their passing reminds me of something grief often teaches. When someone we love dies, the world feels quieter, as if a great tree has fallen in the forest. But the silence is not empty. It holds memory, teaching, laughter, and the wisdom they leave behind. And in that silence, we hear a deeper truth. Loss is not the end of the story.

Advent tells us the same truth.

We hear Isaiah say, "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light" (Isaiah 9:2). We hear Matthew remind us that Jesus is Immanuel, God with us (Matthew 1:23). Before the shepherds hurried to the manger, before the angels filled the sky, the message was already clear. God steps into our sorrow. God takes on our human story. God comes close enough to be held. Dietrich Bonhoeffer once wrote, "Death is not the end. It is the final celebration of a life that is turned toward God." I carried that sentence with me as we laid our loved ones to rest. Their lives now rest in the hands of the One who defeated death by becoming a child in Bethlehem. This is why Advent is a lifeline for anyone ending the year in grief. The Christ-child is not a symbol for a comfortable world. He is God's answer to a hurting one. The incarnation assures us that God does not stand far away. God steps into the darkness with us. God shares the tears, the empty chairs, and the long nights. The manger tells us that hope does not wait for perfect conditions. Hope is born in the middle of pain.

For many in our community, this year has ended with grief. Some of you are preparing for your first Christmas without a spouse, a parent, a child, or a dear friend. Some are carrying invisible pain. Advent does not deny these realities. It meets them with hope. It tells us that even when the year ends in sorrow, the story does not end there. Christ comes to stand beside us in the quiet, in the confusion, and in the empty chairs around our tables.

Minister's Letter continued...

As I returned to Newport-on-Tay, I felt again the joy of being home. This community is our home away from home. Here we live, serve, and raise our children. My family and I are grateful for your prayers while I travelled and your kindness when I returned.

As we walk through Advent together, I invite you to hold two truths close. First, love leaves a mark that death cannot erase. I see that in the legacy of Ma Abeng and Mami Paulina. And I trust you see it in the memories of the loved ones you carry in your heart. Second, the Christ-child brings a hope that does not disappoint. His light reaches even the darkest corners. His peace steadies us when words fail. His presence assures us that God has not forgotten the world. So may this Advent season steady your heart. May it give you courage to face what still hurts and the confidence that God is shaping a future filled with grace. And may the promise of the child in the manger be an anchor for you as this year draws to a close.

The Perils of Saint Ayebin

During a recent interview, I was intrigued by an answer given by a candidate seeking a training placement for the ministry within the Church of Scotland. In response to the following question 'Is Change the only constant in the Church today?' she responded by saying "You come from the Dundee area so you will know all about the perils of Saint Ayebin". Sadly, I didn't, so I made a mental note to investigate the virtues or otherwise of this Saintly character when the interview ended.

She went on to explain, "we once had a minister from Dundee who had a seemingly inherent resistance to change, or any suggestion of change. Every proposal presented at the Kirk Session, from the format of the Communion Service to the biscuit selection for after-service refreshments, were instantly discredited and ultimately rejected with the same concluding argument - but its aye bin!" Such was the frequency of this negative utterance that in his retirement back to Dundee he was lovingly assigned the nickname 'Saint Ayebin' by Session members.

In this period of radical change, as we fulfil the requirements outlined within the Presbytery Plan and transition towards a union with our neighbouring churches, it is inevitable that such a transformation will impact on each and every one of us, and in a myriad of different ways. But unlike David Livingstone's travels, this is not a journey into the unknown ... an unmapped territory fraught with danger, for Jeremiah (29:11) reminds us :

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

The Bible reassures us that we are not alone in our journeying; we have hope and a future. God walks beside us, guiding our steps and holding our lives in His hands, ensuring that we all, individually and collectively, fulfil the purposes he has planned for us. The resulting future will however be different but greatly enriched through both spiritual and material blessings.

We must therefore lean into our faith and navigate the changes, supporting one another as we journey onwards - trusting in God's ultimate plan and not faltering by looking back to the way 'its aye bin!'

Review of Church Roll

As mentioned in the October Journal, our Church keeps a roll of its members, who have joined by profession of faith, or by transfer of certificate, or by resolution of the Kirk Session; and also of adherents who, although not members, regularly attend worship.

We are required to review our rolls annually to ensure that they accurately record those who are taking part in the worship, mission, and service of the church. However, we continue to retain those who are unable to attend worship through ill-health or infirmity. But it is equally worthwhile for each of us to reflect on our own commitment to the work of Christ's church through our dedication of time, talents, and money, and also through the bonds that hold the family of God together. If you are not yet a member and would consider becoming one, please speak to the Minister or your Elder, and we can discuss the next steps.

The process of reviewing the roll also involves removing the names of those we have lost contact with over the years. Members have full voting rights on congregational matters, whereas adherents can only vote on certain matters. As the church reflects on and discusses the Union of the churches in our corner of Fife, it is important that those who are the living stones come together in the name of the Lord God, whom the writer of Hebrews calls "the builder of everything".

So please make this time of review a time also to review your relationship to the church, and if you would consider membership, please get in touch.

Fife Presbytery Plan Implementation

In the latest step of the Fife Presbytery Plan, on 1st January 2026, Balmerino and Wormit Church will join with Creich, Flisk and Kilmany Church to become one church. Under the agreed Basis of Union, they will have one Kirk Session, and services will take place every Sunday in Creich, and either Balmerino or Wormit until the church building at Balmerino is sold.

The next proposed step in the Presbytery Plan will be a union with ourselves in Newport. Under the Presbytery Plan, this should take place within the next two years.

Since the two present Interim Moderators of these churches, Rev Dr Amos Chewachong and Mr Bill Imlay are from Newport Church, there is a clear conflict of interest. So Rev Dr Jonathan Humphry will become Interim Moderator of the new charge of Balmerino, Creich, Flisk, Kilmany and Wormit Church of Scotland.





Christian Aid Christmas Appeal: No Crib for a Bed

This Christmas, Christian Aid is focusing on the conflict in the DRC – Democratic Republic of Congo - and uses the story of one woman, Chance, to illustrate the situation.

Chance is married with 8 children and ran a successful shop in Minova, DRC. Armed conflict broke out, swept the country, and hit Chance's community. Her shop was looted, her neighbour raped and the area was bombed. Chance realised that to survive, the family had to escape immediately. She gathered her children, including her new born baby, and left, as they were. Her husband stayed behind.

After a 50 mile trek Chance and the children reached a camp for displaced people where they now live in a temporary shelter. She has nothing of value and believes her husband is dead. Like most people in the camp she needs everything – food, clothes, bedding, utensils, medicine. Life is very hard for her. She has found some work in nearby fields and earns about 44p/day for food for the children.



The humanitarian emergency in DRC is one of the largest global hunger crises of our time with more than 27million in need of food. Almost one half of deaths of children under 5 is due to malnutrition. Christian Aid is working with trusted partners to provide money to those most in need.

Even as I write this I find it impossible to grasp what this woman and her children have experienced and continue to experience daily.

This Christmas appeal is special as all donations will be matched until the appeal reaches £125,000. This means if you give £1.00 it will be matched to make £2.00, £5.00 becomes £10.00 etc. And of course we can make our giving even more, if we pay tax, by adding Gift Aid to our donation with no cost to ourselves. Red envelopes will be in the pews in December and you can also give online by looking for "Christian Aid Christmas Appeal 2025".

I am very, very aware of the many calls for help made to this congregation, especially at this time of year. But please, and because of the time of year, can you spare a little more for our global neighbours who are "living" in conditions we cannot even begin to imagine?
