## MINISTER'S MESSAGE

### Lent in a Weary Land: Faithfulness Without Bargain

Aristotle once observed that politics is the art of living together. If that is true, ours is an age that seems unsure whether we still know how. "Keep calm and carry on" has long been a British instinct, but lately many admit they are struggling to do either. Across the country, most people believe Britain is on the wrong track. We feel it in the rising cost of living, the strain on the NHS, anxious conversations about Scotland's constitutional future, and a steady erosion of trust in public life. Community bonds feel thinner. The mood is not dramatic panic but quiet fatigue. It is into this atmosphere that the Church prays and speaks. Lent does not remove us from the wilderness. It teaches us how to walk through it. When Jesus entered the wilderness, He faced three temptations, each a subtle bargain. Turn stones into bread. Throw yourself down for spectacle. Bow for power without the cross. Each offer promised something good, but by the wrong path. Provision without trust. Recognition without obedience. Authority without sacrifice. Those temptations are not ancient relics. They are familiar.

In a time of economic pressure, we are tempted to treat security as salvation. When money is tight and the future is uncertain, anxiety whispers that faith must step aside while survival takes centre stage. Yet Jesus reminds us that, "Man shall not live by bread alone." Bread matters. Bills matter. The Church rightly feeds the hungry and keeps warm spaces open. But we also remind a weary culture that human dignity rests, not in what we secure, but in Whom we trust.

In a time of political disillusionment, we are tempted toward cynicism. When leaders disappoint us and institutions falter, it is easy to let bitterness harden the heart. Christ refused spectacle and refused despair. He would not test God for proof. Nor should we measure hope by opinion polls. Lent calls us to steadiness: prayer instead of panic and integrity instead of outrage.

In a culture shaped by identity debates and secular assumptions, we are tempted to soften conviction for acceptance. "Keep your faith private," the age suggests. "Worship quietly, and do not trouble the air." But Jesus' answer still stands: "Worship the Lord your God and serve Him only." The Christian life is not about cultural dominance, nor about fearful retreat. It is about faithful obedience.

So, what sustains us?

First, Identity. Before Jesus did anything, the Father declared Him beloved. In a culture unsure of itself, Christians must remember who they are. We are not defined by tribe, income, or anxiety. We are baptised into Christ. Second, Scripture. Jesus answered temptation not with innovation, but with God's Word. Lent invites us back to the Bible, not as decoration, but as daily bread. Third, Community. In a society worried about cohesion, the local church becomes a small but real sign of another kingdom. Around Word and Sacrament, we practise forgiveness, generosity, truthfulness, and hope. A small parish may seem insignificant on the map, yet faithfulness in small places sustains more than we know. Fourth, Hope. Not shallow optimism, but resurrection hope. Britain may feel weary, but Christ is not weary. The cross looked like defeat. It was a victory. The wilderness felt empty. Angels came.

Lent also confronts us with a harder truth. Sometimes the wilderness is not merely cultural or economic. Sometimes it is deeply personal. Sometimes everything falls apart. In Job 1:13-22, loss arrives in waves. Livelihood destroyed. Servants killed. Wealth gone. And then the worst news of all: his children were dead in a sudden collapse. The messengers barely finish speaking before the next one arrives. It is relentless. Job does not minimise his pain. He mourns deeply, yet he refuses to curse God. Instead, he declares, "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord." This is not denial but defiant trust. His suffering exposes a false idea that faith guarantees a stable life. In losing wealth, security, and family, the real question becomes clear: will he love God only for the gifts, or trust Him when they are gone?

That same question faces Christians today. Believers may lose work, health, reputation, freedom, or long-held plans. In such seasons, we are tempted either to despair or to bargain with God. Job shows another way. He grieves honestly and worships anyway, remembering that everything, even life itself, is a gift. For Christians, this truth is anchored in the cross. Jesus entered loss fully and entrusted Himself to the Father. Good Friday was real, yet Easter followed. We do not know what lies ahead, but the future rests in God's hands. Lent calls us to a faith mature enough to hold grief and trust together.

## Youth Update

February's weather was wet and miserable, but the Youth Group still managed to make the most of things with an in-house movie night. Everyone enjoyed the movie, and popcorn is easy to Hoover up, so that was a win all-round.

In our Sunday morning studies we have continued to look at the prophets, and how they reveal the nature of God and how He wants us to draw close to him. In our last study of the month we read about Jonah and how he turned back to God when he was at rock bottom. We also learned how God's willingness to forgive the repentant is greater than our willingness to condemn our enemies, and reflected on Jesus' life and act of forgiveness on the cross. In his book, Jonah tried to dodge following God's command, and for fun the teenagers came up with some creative excuses for not handing in homework. I was both pleasantly surprised and quietly alarmed at how easily they came up with their own homework dodges, so parents and teachers, beware!

We are planning a return trip to the Dundee Youth for Christ Sunday evening session on Sunday 8th March, when several youth groups from the area come together for games, prizes, live praise music, food, and a message aimed at this age group. The Youth found our previous outing most enjoyable, and we are anticipating a good response from this one.

A date for the family diary: the following manna evening is Sunday 22nd March. Our last manna evening of February included the usual drinks and snacks, some improbable uses of chairs, and a corny rhyming challenge. We also had a discussion after one of the group gave a personal testimony about how and why she observes the season of Lent. It's times like these which reveal that, although they are in our care for just an hour or two a week, God can work in and through these youngsters at all times.

Please continue to keep our youth in your prayers, and remember to show they are welcome in our church family.

## A conversation with ... Stephen Armstrong

*Hi Stephen! Tell us a bit about yourself.*

I am Stephen Armstrong: pianist, piano teacher, and musician. I have been teaching the piano privately and full-time at the High School of Dundee since 2000, and I joined the University of St Andrews as an Associate Teacher of Piano in 2016. As a performer, I play regularly with my colleague and great friend Avril Evans as the Armstrong Evans Piano Duo. Together, we have performed much of the piano duet repertoire in many venues across the UK. I am passionate about the instrument and always feel privileged to guide pupils of all ages and abilities into the joy of learning the piano.



*How did your passion for the piano begin?*

Originally from Glasgow, I began my studies at age eight with two local teachers, Mrs Crichton and Mr Holdsworth. Both were lovely people who truly enjoyed teaching. I started playing because my best friend was having lessons, so I asked my parents if I could join in. We didn't have a piano and I don't come from a musical family, but I remember my parents being very supportive and buying me an electronic keyboard. I was always fascinated by the upright piano in the hall of my primary school; I was desperate to play it. When I was 14, my parents bought me a recording of Rachmaninov's Second Piano Concerto and the Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini. I was hooked; I knew then that I wanted to become a pianist. I also remember attending the BBC Young Musician of the Year final at the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall when I was 12. Hearing Freddy Kempf win with that same Rachmaninov Rhapsody was a massive influence. In my teens, my biggest influence was my secondary school music teacher, Elizabeth Cowie. She had two upright pianos in her classroom, and we would spend lunch breaks and free periods sight-reading through countless duets and concertos. I became obsessed; other school studies went out the window as I practised for four hours every day. Saturdays were spent in Glasgow city centre, visiting Biggar's Music Shop on Sauchiehall Street to search through sheet music. I must have spent hundreds of pounds on scores—all of which I still have. Afterwards, I would head to Tower Records on Argyle Street to buy every piano CD I could afford. While every teacher has inspired me, my studies at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland (formerly RSAMD) with Murray McLachlan were the most pivotal. Murray continues to be a huge inspiration for my teaching and performing today.

*Tell us about your role at the High School of Dundee and the University of St Andrews.*

At the High School of Dundee, I teach approximately 40 pupils ranging from Primary 2 to S6. We are fortunate to have outstanding facilities, with all lessons taking place on high-quality acoustic upright and grand pianos. My own school piano has become a very valued friend! Beyond teaching, I coach other instrumentalists and singers as an accompanist for exams and concerts. I particularly love playing for our P4 and P5 choir at the fabulous Caird Hall. I also administer our ABRSM exam visits; in 2024, the High School of Dundee became an ABRSM Partner School—one of only two in Scotland! Ten years ago, I also began teaching at the University of St Andrews, where I work with a varied range of students and adults. I truly enjoy the different dynamic of working with adult learners at the purpose-built Laidlaw Music Centre.

*The Piano Festival is an important part of the High School music calendar; what's on the menu for staff, students, and the wider community?*

The Piano Festival at the High School of Dundee was established in 2024 following a meeting with Murray McLachlan. To celebrate having one of the country's most in-demand pianists visit our school, I set up the inaugural festival. With the support of my two piano teaching colleagues, Avril Evans and Hannah Chan, it consists of three days of performances, including lunchtime recitals by the faculty, a "piano meet-up" for the school community, and free trial lessons. The event concludes with a masterclass and recital by a guest artist. Following Philip Sharp in 2025, we are thrilled to welcome Rose McLachlan this year. Rose is the daughter of Murray McLachlan and is an exceptional pianist. We are excited to hear her perform on our wonderful Yamaha concert grand.\*

*Why do you think the piano has remained popular for centuries?*

The piano is incredibly versatile. From Bach, Beethoven, and Chopin to Elton John, Coldplay, and Lady Gaga, it spans genres like no other instrument. While the keys are black and white, the infinite "colours" we can conjure from the keyboard are what make it so exciting.

*As an established pianist and teacher, what advice would you give to someone who is thinking about pursuing a career in music?*

My advice to anyone considering a career in music is to listen as much as possible—both to recordings and live concerts. Go to masterclasses, explore contemporary music alongside the classics, and be open to new ideas. Visit art galleries and the theatre; let all art inform your music-making. If you want to teach, be passionate. Become the best pianist you can be and study different pedagogical methods. It is a privilege to introduce someone to this joy, and it is something we must never take for granted.

*And finally, can you recommend a piano piece for us to listen to?*

Choosing one recommendation is impossible, but if you are new to classical piano, Rachmaninov's Second Piano Concerto is difficult to beat for its lush melodies. If you are looking for something different, I recommend the piano music of the late Scottish composer John McLeod; his piano music is brilliant and very accessible. The piano music has been recorded by Murray McLachlan.

\*Rose McLachlan will be performing in Trinity Hall at the High School of Dundee on Friday 6th March at 5pm. Tickets are £8 for adults and free to children.
