


MINISTER'S MESSAGE - Advent 2020 'Broken Futures' and the Christ Child

The year 2020 has been a very challenging one for all of us. The outbreak of Covid-19 and its global spread has had life-changing consequences on humanity and shown us how fleeting our years in this life are! It is estimated that, over a million people worldwide have died from the virus with the United Kingdom losing almost 60,000 people from that number. We have spent most of the year confined to our homes, working virtually and unable to fully enjoy the traditional family and friendship bonds that hold people together in love and give mutual sense of hope in times of crises. In the midst of the crisis, several interpretations have emerged, including from false prophets who

proclaim ill-fated messages and misleading theologies to suggest that the pandemic is a result of God's wrath upon sinful humanity and a sign that the world is coming to an end. No wonder Tom Wright quickly published his 2020 monograph entitled, God and the Pandemic: A Christian Reflection on the Coronavirus and its Aftermath. Wright challenges any superstitious and presumptuous attitudes towards the virus and invites us to 'consider different ways of seeing and responding to the virus - a way that draws on the teachings and examples of Scripture, and above all on the way of living, thinking and praying revealed in Jesus'. But coronavirus is not the only big issue making headlines this year! The Black Lives Matter Global Network that was re-ignited in the United States of America after the killing of George Floyd by a white policeman, and which swept across the western world challenged institutionalised racism and the marginalisation of minority ethnic groups within nation-states; meanwhile numerous killings in war torn and ravaged countries around the world due to sectarianism or ethnic conflicts again revealed a world that is truly groaning, to use the words of apostle Paul. Further still, the confession of a woman who transitioned to a male as a teenager and now regrets the fact that her feelings were not properly investigated, and the court ruling that children younger than 16 are unlikely to give informed consent for transgender engagements, has once more proven that what God has created no culture should reinvent! The young woman in question remarked: 'gender dysphoria left me depressed and anxious'.

The recent announcement of The World Meteorological Organisation (WMO) that the average global temperature in 2020 is set to be about 1.2°C above the preindustrial (1850-1900), making the year on track to be one of the three warmest on record, also signifies increasing climate change problems for our world. All those problems, which are not at all exhaustive, make life on earth more of a burden than a blessing. Our personal lives and work and worship have been completely disrupted and our trajectories of having pleasure and leisure altered. The unpredictability and rapidity of some of the changes have created great anxiety in personal and public lives. Individuals, nations and churches are creatively trying to navigate their way through these changes, and I think there is no better way to express our feelings than in the comments of Gary V Nelson on Leonard Hjalmarson's book, *Broken Futures: Leaders & Churches Lost in Transition*, published in 2018:

We live amidst the collision of cultures and of worldviews, and the collapse of the Enlightenment synthesis. Rapid and unpredictable changes generate anxiety within us and stress within the organisations we lead. Individuals, institutions and whole communities are in transition. "Church" and "Christian" now carry baggage they didn't possess, and have different meanings relative to individual experience. Thankfully, we have guides who through the centuries have gone before us, entering into the paradox of pilgrimage, getting beyond the polarities of movement and stability.

Within these broken futures of unpredictable changes, challenges and anxiety, Christian people have an expectation and a hope that is anchored on the birth of a child. 'For to us a child is born, to us a Son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called wonderful counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace' (Isaiah 9:6). The prophet Isaiah spoke into a situation where Judah felt powerless because their enemies only seemed to grow in strength and tighten their grasp, and they did not know if God was for them or against them or if he had simply abandoned them.

That is how most of us feel today! In the midst of a virus that is threatening the security of humanity on earth, conflicts and wars that have gone on for far too long, poverty and disease in poorer countries, the marginalisation of sections of society within nation-states, and a significant loss of confidence in democratic principles to solve human problems. However, among Isaiah's prophecies about their future defeat, exile, and return, he included two prophetic visions of a child who would represent God's presence, embody his characteristics, and bear the responsibility of governing his people. That prophecy was about Jesus Christ. Immanuel means God with us and it is an encouragement that God is indeed on our side, an assurance that by the time this child is grown, we would not be defeated.

The presence of a vaccine for Covid-19 Coronavirus signifies hope and a return to normalcy in the world, but the expectation and birth of Jesus Christ our Saviour gives Christian confidence that we are not alone in our struggles. As we look forward to Christmas and to receiving the Christ child, and as we look forward to the New Year, 2021, with renewed confidence, let us 'rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation and be constant in prayer' (Romans 12:12).

I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year, 2021.

Update on Church Services and our Parish

Following the conclusion of our second trial, the Kirk Session have agreed to continue with the current single Sunday Service strategy, alternating between 'physical' Church Services and 'virtual' on-line Services using the Zoom Conferencing Platform. The Schedule of Services over the Christmas period is printed elsewhere within this journal.

For those of you who regularly attend our Church Services, we thank you for following our booking process and adhering to our safe distancing guidance and hygiene protocols when in Church.

'I am the Lord, I do not change' Malachi 3:6

Many of you will be aware that significant change is proposed within our North Fife Cluster of Churches. The 'Well Equipped Spaces in the Right Places' consultation undertaken by the General Trustees identified resources considered essential for worship, mission and outreach both currently and in the future. Buildings which can no longer be cost-justified or considered to serve a meaningful purpose will be sold, with other local assets, e.g. community halls, becoming the focus for Worship Services in the future. Our own buildings were rated in the highest category and will therefore be retained.

In conjunction with this property review, the Presbytery Plan and North Fife Cluster Plan have identified the need to rationalise Parish (Congregational) boundaries to reflect the significant reduction in Ministers anticipated within our Cluster.

'The Presbytery has agreed (without dissent from any member of the Presbytery including those from the North Fife Parishes) that 2 FTE ministry positions be allocated to the North Fife Cluster.'

Correspondingly, a proposal to establish two Parishes from existing congregations by June 2021 has been agreed in principle by St. Andrews Presbytery, the membership of each enlarged Parish however remains undecided and will ultimately be determined by the new Presbytery of Fife. A further proposition has been aired proposing a subsequent merger of these two Parishes into one large Parish after 2024. The wording '2 FTE ministry positions' (Full Time Equivalent) rather than two Ministers has intentionally been employed to offer a degree of flexibility in the future, as this allocation could represent 2 Ministers of Word and Sacrament, or one Minister of Word and Sacrament and a Mission Worker, or any combination of these and other full and/or part-time positions.

We, the Kirk Session, will endeavour to keep you up to date with all subsequent developments.

Christian Aid

It's a long time since I wrote about Christian Aid but over the last months I have been receiving regular up-dates from them.

This year Christian Aid is 75 but almost all of their regular fund-raising has been affected by the virus - no door-to-door collections in Christian Aid Week, no Bridge Crosses, no real breakfasts or lunches, only virtual events. The result is that, like most charities, their income has been badly hit.

But the virus knows no geographical boundaries and Christian Aid is aware of the devastating effects it is having in countries where they are working. They have been providing simple measures which can make a big difference and measures we take for granted - clean water, soap, basic medical supplies. As in the West, livelihoods and incomes have been affected by the virus and families require basic help to get by. If you go online to Christian Aid's website you will find information on their work.

As usual, Christian Aid has a Christmas Appeal and this year it is focussed on the effect of climate change, particularly in Ethiopia. Climate change and its effects is, of course, the other huge looming problem for us all.



As I have not run any fund-raising event this year, I decided to set up a Just Giving page for the Christmas Appeal and if anyone would like to contribute to this, please go to www.justgiving.com/margaret-imlay. I will be very grateful for donations and would remind you that you can gift aid if you pay tax.

There are several Christmas events on the Christian Aid website but I thought the following might be of particular interest. There is a video conversation between Sally Foster-Fulton and Rev Dr Martin Fair, Moderator of the Church of Scotland at www.christianaid.org.uk/scotlandchristmas. The same site gives details of a workshop on 'Just Christmas'. This could be used by a small group meeting either in person or virtually.

If anyone is interested in virtual gifts which can normally be ordered via the wee Charity Gifts booklet then go to www.charity-gifts.christianaid.org.uk. You can buy cocoa saplings for £9, send a child to school for £15 or provide clean water for a family for £30.

Finally, if you wish to make a donation to Christian Aid but are not happy to do so online then a cheque can be sent. However this should go to the main office in London as Scottish offices are closed and the staff are working from home. As with many things this year, our Remembrance events were very different but nonetheless poignant.


Due to Government restrictions we were unable to invite uniformed organisations to join our morning service and have an Ecumenical Service of Remembrance at the War Memorial.
